## Form CRS - Client Relationship Summary

### Introduction

Nikulski Financial, Inc., is an investment adviser registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. We feel that it is important for you to understand how advisory and brokerage services and fees differ in order to determine which type of account is right for you. There are free and simple tools available to research firms and financial professionals at <a href="https://www.investor.gov/CRS">www.investor.gov/CRS</a>, which also provides educational materials about investment advisers, broker-dealers, and investing.

## What investment services and advice can you provide me?

We are a registered investment adviser that offers investment advisory services to clients. Our advisory services include Asset Management, and Financial Planning & Consulting. If you open an advisory account with our firm, we'll meet with you to understand your current financial situation, existing resources, goals, and risk tolerance. Based on what we learn, we'll recommend a portfolio of investments that is monitored at least annually, and if necessary, rebalanced to meet your changing needs, stated goals and objectives. We'll offer you advice on a regular basis and contact you at least annually to discuss your portfolio. We do not require a minimum dollar amount to open and maintain an advisory account.

We manage accounts on a discretionary basis. After you sign an agreement with our firm, we're allowed to buy and sell investments in your account without asking you in advance. Any limitations will be described in the signed advisory agreement. We will have discretion until the advisory agreement is terminated by you or our firm. We do not restrict our advice to limited types of products or investments. However, our firm does not utilize mutual funds unless specifically required by you. Our firm does not impose requirements for opening and maintaining accounts or otherwise engaging us.

Financial Planning & Consulting is offered as a separate service for a flat or hourly fee. We do not monitor your investments for the Financial Planning & Consulting service. Financial Planning services are offered to Asset Management clients through eMoney at no additional cost.

## What Fees will I pay?

You will be charged an ongoing quarterly fee based on the value of the investments in your account. Our Asset Management fee schedule ranges from 0.50% to 1.50% depending on the value of the investments in your account. The more assets you have in your advisory account, the more you will pay us. We therefore have an incentive to increase the assets in your advisory account in order to increase our fees. Our fees vary and are non-negotiable. The amount you pay will depend, for example, on the services you receive and the amount of assets in your account. Our firm's fees will be automatically deducted from your advisory account, which will reduce the value of your advisory account. In rare cases, our firm will agree to send you invoices rather than automatically deduct our firm's fees from your advisory account.

Our maximum flat fee is \$10,000 and our maximum hourly rate is \$350 for our Financial Planning & Consulting service. We charge an upfront retainer when you sign an agreement, and we charge you when we provide a financial plan or consultation.

The custodian that holds your assets may charge you a transaction fee when we buy or sell an investment for you. The custodian's transaction fees are in addition to our firm's fees for our Asset Management service. The custodian that we use does not charge transaction fees for U.S. listed equities and exchange traded funds. You may also pay charges imposed by the custodian holding your accounts for certain investments and maintaining your account. Our custodian will charge you an annual holding fee to custody a non-standard asset. Some investments, such as mutual funds, and exchange traded funds, charge additional fees that will reduce the value of your investments over time.

In certain cases, we may select third party money managers, sub-advisers, and/or separate account managers who will assist us with managing your account. If selected, they will charge you a fee, which will be described to you in their Form ADV and/or agreement.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

• Help me understand how these fees and costs may affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs and how much will be invested for me?

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice, we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means:

Since we recommend third party money managers to assist with managing certain accounts, we have an incentive to recommend a manager who provides our firm the most economic benefits compared to other managers. If the separately managed assets increase in value, the fee that you pay to the manager will increase as will the fee that you pay our firm.

As an investment adviser that charges an asset-based fee, the more assets there are in a clients advisory account, the more the client will pay in fees, and the Firm could therefore have an incentive to encourage the client to increase the assets in his or her account.
